Sir:

Referring to Office letter of July 31st, marked "Education - Administration, 56886-1909, A.V.S." and relative to a request from Tony W. Tillohash that he should be allowed to return to his home, I respectfully report that this young man was enrolled on October 12th, 1905, for a five year term.

He has become quite proficient as a harnessmaker since that time and has advanced from the 3rd Grade to the 6th Grade in his academic work.

In view of the fact that Tony is such a desirable pupil and that he has only become afflicted with a desire to go home at this season when similar requests are so numerous, I respectfully recommend that he should not be allowed to ignore the terms of the contract he signed when he submitted his application blank for enrolment and that he should not be allowed to return to his home until he has completed his full term of enrolment.

boarding school for
two years and entered
Carlisle Indian School

Oct 12, 1905.

I am now 23, year of
age, I can take a good
care of myself, if at
home I shall walk
in the upright way
so that the my tribe
may follow my steps.

my home is in the
Southern part of
Utah, my tribe Paria.

I am doing this for
my own benefit and
suppose that you
will not misunder-
stand it this my
conversation.

my railroad affair
will be to Salt Lake

city, where I shall
 find any employment
 I shall find this in
 the honor of Carlisle
 of which I am represent.
 It is very difficult
 for me to learn any
 more, so therefore I
 doing this inquiriment
 It will be better for me
 to earn my bread and
 butter.

Now with a great deal of
 pleasure I will close.
