The Honorable, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C.

Sir:

I regret very much to report the death of Madeline Goslin, enroled here from Odanah, Wisconsin, since October 22nd, 1909, and which occurred at 3.00 o'clock yesterday morning.

School physician Dr. Shoemaker handed me the following report:

"I have to report that Madeline Goslin, who recently entered the school from Wisconsin, died this morning at 3.00 o'clock.

Her case was obscure in many particulars, but death was probably due to cerebro-spinal meningitis following an attack of measles. As three members of her family, mother, brother, and sister, died of tuberculosis, the meningitis was probably of tubercular origin.

She entered the hospital on December 27th".

The father of the girl was communicated with by wire and he instructed me to ship the body to Odanah. Arrangements are being made to do so on an evening train today. Funeral services will be conducted at 4.00 o'clock this afternoon and will be attended by the student body.

## Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Superintendent Campbell has been informed of the facts in the case and the father of the girl was further notified by letter yesterday.
