In response you are informed that authority has been granted to the Superintendent of the Carlisle School to enroll this young man, with the understanding that he shall pay from personal funds all transportation expenses to and from Carlisle, and all tuition fees, board, and other expenses while there. Before sending Mr. Manawa to Carlisle it is suggested that Mr. Cook communicate with the Superintendent of that school and make all necessary arrangements for his enrollment in advance.

The Office has received a letter from the Superintendent of the Union Agency in Oklahoma, transmitting one from Mr. Fred S. Cook, District Agent, regarding the enrollment in Carlisle School of a full blood Creek Indian by the name of George Manawa.

In his letter Mr. Cook says that the Indian boy in question is 18 years of age, has had some schooling, but is not very far advanced in his studies, and that he is a bright and intelligent young fellow. In order to assist this young man in his efforts to procure a higher education, authority is hereby granted you to enroll George Manawa as a pupil, with the understanding that he shall pay from personal funds all transportation expenses to and from Carlisle, and all tuition fees, board, and other expenses while there.

Sir:-

On December 3, 1909, I wrote a letter to the Superintendent of the United States Indian School at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, asking if it were possible to have enrolled there a member of the Five Civilized Tribes and in reply I received a letter dated December 6, 1909, signed by M. Friedmann, Superintendent of said school advising me that they were not allowed to enroll members of the Five Civilized Tribes at that school, and suggested that I request authority from the Commissioner of Indian affairs for enrollment of said person, advising him that there were sufficient means to reimburse the Government for transportation tuition, board, etc.

For your information you are advised that I am guardian for a full blood Creek Indian boy about 18 years of age, named George Manawa. He has had some schooling but is not very far advanced in his studies. He is a bright intelligent young fellow but if allowed to remain on the streets as he is doing, in my opinion will never amount to much.



I will have shortly, enough funds belonging to him to school him for two or three years at some good school and I would like very much, as an example for a great many other Greek boys, especially of the full blood, to be allowed to send him to Carlisle to school. I will have enough money to pay all transportation, tuition, board and anything that is necessary for his welfare.

I believe, if allowed to do this, that it will be a good example to set out for the other Indians and I would thank you very much to take this matter up with the Commissioner of Indian Affairs and see if authority can be granted to send him to the Indian School at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, free of cost to the Government.

Please advise me as early as possible relative to this matter.
