Sir:

In response to your letter of March 10, 1910, requesting that your son, Cody Printup, be permitted to returned to his home for a visit during the summer vacation, you are advised that your son has at present a good home near Carlisle where he is receiving valuable training and good influences, which will help fit him to make his own way in the world after his separation from the school. Experience has shown that it is not wise, as a general rule, to grant vacations from the Carlisle School during the period of enrollment, and the children are given an outing away from the school during the vacation season.

Under the circumstances, and for the best interests of your boy, the Office feels it inadvisable to comply with your request at this time.

Sir:

Referring to Office letter of March 25th, calling attention to a communication from the father of Cody Printup, one of our students, this is to say that there are good and sufficient reasons why the boy should not be granted permission to spend the summer at home. The little fellow has a good home on the outskirts of Carlisle where he is being brought up as one of a very fine family and where he is receiving too valuable training to spend any time away from its good influences.

It has been my policy to oppose the granting of vacations during the period of enrolment of students at Carlisle for the reason that children always have a chance to take an outing away from school under our Outing system and so that there is no let-up of any kind in giving them training in those qualities that give

them strength to live up to their best when they return to their homes at the termination of their periods of enrolment.

This is not an arbitrary policy of mine, but it has been my experience that the best results can be accomplished when students are taken away from their homes and then trained consistently, continually and without any periods of returning to the laxer methods of Indian communities and Indian homes.
