Dear Sir:

I, Joseph Loudbear a graduate of Carlisle Indian School, wish to go home and help my uncle, Eugene Many Deeds who has charge of my property such as horses and cattle and my allotment. He has had charge of my property since I left for school two years ago and five years prior. As I knew that I would graduate this year, my expectations were to go home and help my uncle in his work for the interest he took in my welfare. But I was rather disappointed when they told me that I must have a position to go to, or else a recommendation from some person before they would let me leave the school. As far as I am concerned, I am not relying on no Governement position for my future work in life; the only reason is that I have other resources to rely upon. The main one that I class above all is that of a stock breeder. I had learn the various things about this work while at home, and here under the Outing.

I write this thinking that perhaps you have in your power to let me leave the school before the month is out. There is a good deal of work for my uncle to do, and for this reason I wish to help him.

Mr. Valentine, I don't see why they are holding me here after graduation. If they knew that I was not going to make good after leaving school, why did they let me pass for a graduate.
