Ida Sands, also known as Ida Coon Sands, was returned to school on June the 2nd, last, in accordance with the report of pending negotiations made in my letter of May the 23rd.

The girl was not sent home at that time, for the reason that it was not considered advisable to allow her to travel without an escort. She has caused no extra trouble since her return to school except so far as extra watchfulness has been required, and for that reason it was deemed best to hold her here until an escort can be detailed. It will be convenient to do this before the end of this month, so that the girl should be at home before August 1st.
