I transmit herewith copies of letters that have passed between Supervisor Mrs. Newton and myself. As provision has been made for children of white parentage to enter Indian schools under certain conditions and as Porto Rican and Filipino boys have been admitted to Carlisle under similar conditions, I respectfully request that my action in this case be approved and that if the boys are found to be eligible in all other particulars than their Tribe that I be granted permission to enrol them and to so report them on the Quarterly Attendance report.

You may inform the boys that it will be necessary to deposit \$167.00 for each year's board and tuition and that their traveling expenses to and from school will also have to be provided out of their own personal funds.

I thank you for having referred this matter to me and for any additional assistance you can render in this connection. I would be glad to hear from other young people who desire to enrol at Carlisle under similar arrangements.

My dear Mr. Friedman:

Two Cherokee boys belonging to the unrestricted class of Indians, have indicated a wish to attend Carlisle. One of them has been an instructor in one of our schools, and the other an advanced student. I understand that they are able to pay their own way and they wish to know what amount will be necessary to cover their board and tuition at the Carlisle School.

I said tentatively that I presumed \$200 would cover these expenses, and that they would also have to pay their transportation both ways, but before a definite answer is made to them I wish to know from you whether I have made a proper statement.

It may be that you do not wish them to enter, having already as many applicants as you can take care of.

Kindly let me hear from you as early as possible, as the boys are waiting for a final answer.

I thank you for General Pratt's address, and also for your letter.
