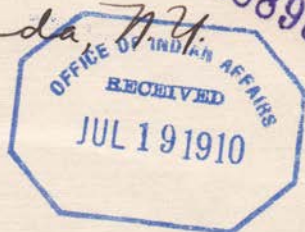

Dear Sir:

I too, make an appeal to you in behalf of my younger brother Harold Bishop. I am on my vacation, after five years at Carlisle. I intend to return in the fall and finish my studies there. I want to take Harold back with me. ^{Ed} but he is not of the required age - fourteen years. He is anxious to go with me and mother wants him to go.

I am only sixteen years of age and am five feet and ten inches tall. He is thirteen and about five feet tall. We are both large for our age. There are many boys at Carlisle that are much smaller in stature than he is. The school on the reservation is not the thing for him. Too gentle in discipline. He does his work all right but often takes a notion to play the truant. The boys on the reservation are not of the right stock for young boys to associate with and they have been the means of many a boy's downfall. The school

is some two miles away - the snow in winter being considered, it is evident that a hard tramp lays before him each day and he a young boy.

We are from a large family, our step-father Mr. Benjamin Logan has six children - our half-sisters and brothers. He is a strong believer in the old way - still an 'old Indian.' He has to work hard, very hard, to support the family and it would be a great help to him to have his burden lightened.

Harold is anxious to be a good man where he grows up - like our father whom he has never seen. Father died just before

he was born. And so he is minus a great blessing - a father's loving care. Mother has tried her best and her most but she has a large family to tend to. As I have said, he wishes to be a good man - but a good man is a hard thing to mold on the reservation. Carlisle! give him a Carlisle training and there can be no better thing for the young boy. Best, there is a law affecting the age of Indian children when entering a non-reservation school. Hence, this humbly appeal. Do you not know that "even the dogs thrive on the crumbs that fall from the masters' table and the weaker see nothing?"

Can you, will you not make
it possible to have my
brother admitted to Carleton,
Mr. Valentine, you, as Commis-
sioner of Indian Affairs,
should be able to do so.

My home is at Versailles, but I
am working at my trade of printing
here at Gowanda, hence, my
address. I make this
a personal appeal to you
Mr. Valentine because I love
my brother and wish to see him
in a good place. Help us and
help him. Hoping for a
favorable reply, I am

and in regard to his attending Carlisle
school this fall if possible.

The boy is not quite fourteen years old
but is large for his age.

He is anxious to go back this fall when
his brother goes back for the fall term.
And another reason I am anxious
for him to get into such a school
and he is a good singer.

Our district school here has only small
pupils and he does not get the strict
schooling here, he would get at Carlisle.
He wants to be in such a school, as
other parties will write you from
here about this same boy.

I have other duties to care for and

am the only one to care for him, his father died when he was an infant. He some times slips away from home as the surroundings at home not being the very best, he seeks peace else where. So I thought I would apply to you to help me to get the boy in some home and school, for I know he would be contented at Carlisle.

It will only be a little while he will be fourteen.

I wrote to M. Friedman about this same subject, and he advised me to write to you at once in regard to the boy.

I hope you will see to the matter at once, and make arrangements with the Supt. Friedman to take the boy this fall.
