I quote below a portion of a letter just received from Mr. O. H. Lipps, Supervisor in charge of the Union Agency, at Muskogee, Oklahoma, in which it will be noted that he recommends the enrollment of a child of eleven years: --

"I enclose herewith four applications of Captain Jackson W. Ellis for the enrollment of his four children at Haskell Institute. These applications are correct and regular in every way with the exception of that of Blain Ellis, who is only 11 years of age. While I know it is your rule not to enroll pupils under 14 years of age, still I thought that rather than separate a family of children you may have a way of securing authority for the enrollment of children under fourteen years of age.

Captain Ellis is perhaps one of the most noted members of the Cherokee tribe and it is the desire of the officials here to extend to him every courtesy possible on account of his long and valued service to the Government in various ways. The mother of these children is dead and he is very anxious to keep them together, and to have them get a good education. He tells me that he has spent everything he has been able to save for years in the education of these children, and that he has even had to mortgage his land in order to get money to pay for their schooling. He informs me that he has reached the stage now where he must have some help and feels that the Government ought to be as considerate of his wishes as possible."

Mr. Lipps states the case fully and I respectfully request that, under the circumstances enumerated by him, we may

Dear Sir:

Find enclosed application for Nellie L. Ellis,
Jackson N. Ellis and Richard Ellis. Blair Ellis being too
young, and Charlotte Ellis being too old, that is being of age
and does not wish to go, therefore, I am only making applications
for three. These children are the grand children of N. J. Smith,
deceased, who was for many years chief of the eastern band of
Cherokees in North Carolina.

Their mother died more than ten years ago. I, myself am a member of the western band of Cherokees, and was for many years connected with the Interior Department through the Indian Agency at this place. But I resigned my position as Captain of the Police and have put in the last ten years raising my children.

We have spent large sums of money and have nothing left now but our alotments, and would gladly give that for a thorough education.

My children are nice, smart, and bright, and do not show much Indian. They are healthy, clean, without any contageous deseases, neither have there been any contageous deseases in the history of either side of the family. We also can give references if it is required from Senators of our state or bankers, or government employees of the Union Agency here.

I write you plain and the true facts in the case, for the reason I have been very prominent all my life in this western country, and have been able to command a great deal of Finance at different times. My associates and old friends of this country would hardly admit or believe that I am in a financially strained condition, however, I have done my part as a father to the present time. Now I ask you to consider our applications favorably if possible, and we will appreciate the same and bind ourselves to obey all rules and regulations.

Furthermore our country is a new country and the changes that have taken place with us Indians from reservation to state-hood and the peculiar and unsettled conditions that have always existed, are such now that our schools are scattered, inconvenient, and the Indian schools are crowded.

I believe that an education in the East is far more advantageous to children than in the West, especially for Indians.

In response to your informal inquiry concerning the children of Captain Jack Ellis of Marble City, Oklahoma, and his application for their admission to the Carlisle Indian School, Pennsylvania, I have the honor to inform you that it has been the policy and uniform practice of the Indian Office not to enroll children of the Five Civilized Tribes, Oklahoma, in Carlisle, and after careful consideration of the request of Captain Ellis the Office finds that any departure from this long-established rule would be detrimental to the best interests of the Service.

Captain Ellis has been written to this effect,
and it has been suggested to him that he apply to Supervisor Oscar H. Lipps, Muskogee, Oklahoma, for the enrollment of his children in Haskell Institute, Lawrence, Kansas, a school which has excellent facilities for and can
give them thorough instruction and training in both academic
and industrial lines.
