

Sir: -

Friedman, Superintendent of the United States Indian School at Carlisle, Pa., advised Mrs. Amanda Wilson, a full blood Delaware citizen of the Cherokee Nation, that her 13 years old grandson and ward cannot be enrolled in the Carlisle school unless special permission is granted by the Indian Office. Mr. Friedman suggested that the matter be taken up with the Indian Office at Washington.

Mrs. Wilson's grandson and ward, Robert Newcomb, is an orphan. He has an income of from \$150.00 to \$400.00 per month, oil royalties on his own allotment and the allotment of his deceased father. The young man has successfully passed the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th grades of the common schools in this country, and has for two years been a student in a Military Academy at Mexico, Missouri. He is fully capable of passing the entrance examination to the Preparatory Department of the Carlisle Indian School, his training in the common schools and in the Military Academy having been of such a character that he would have no difficulty in gain—

ing a first class standing in any preparatory school of the country.

The young man will be 14 years of age in March 1911. Training in the Military school has given him a strong body and a clear mind.

Mrs. Wilson, the young man's guardian, is very anxious that he be enrolled in the Carlisle Indian School, and I have the honor to recommend that, if it is possible, special permission be granted by your office to enroll this young man at Carlisle.
