If I have not made it plain enough to them, I cannot say anything more. I have made it as plain as I could, telling the object of mine for wanting to attend school. There is only one object why all others wish to attend school and that is to learn something.

If I would have had the same chance as others have I wouldn't trouble you at this time. I have made a good record in the school where I have been the last four years, that is since I was at liberty to do as I please and I have, as I believe, made the best of what time I did spend in school.

I have graduated in Genoa Indian School in Nebraska and was advised by my teacher, Miss E. L. Fisher of Genoa, Nebraska, that if I possibly could, to attend school either at Haskell or at Carlisle, as these schools are farther advanced

in studies than all others, and as far as recommendation goes you can ask Miss E. L. Fisher of Genoa, Nebraska, and she will tell all that is necessary. And if you don't care to do so I have nothing more to say for myself and will have to be satisfied with the outcome of it.

I am willing to do the fair thing with you as well as any one else, and expect the same of you, and if you don't care to admit me in your school as an Indian pupil, you can tell me about it in plain language instead of trying to make excuses.

I will be glad to hear from you again, I remain."

As the young man is anxious to have a definite reply in regard to the action taken concerning his application for enrolment at Carlisle, I trust that Office will advise me without delay.


