Sir:

Referring to your letter of November 22, and to other correspondence with the Office concerning the application for enrollment of John Ostrigain, an Alaskan boy who arrived at your school, having traveled thereto at his own expense, the Office believes on reconsideration of the matter that in the light of the peculiar circumstances in this case, and because it is thought this boy will make the best use of any advantages which can be afforded him, an exception should be made in his case and he should be admitted to the school.

Therefore, if you are still in communication with him or can ascertain his present place of residence, you may arrange for his return and enrollment, without any expense, however, for transportation.

This action, however, will not be considered a precedent for the enrollment of Alaskan pupils in the future, and you are requested to exercise care in order that non-compliance with

the regulations concerning this class of pupils shall not occur.

Sir:

The Office acknowledges the receipt of your letter of October 26, requesting permission to enroll at your school John Ostrgain, an Alaskan boy who arrived there several days ago and who states that he is now 18 years of age, and that his former home was at Wood's Island, Alaska.

In reply you are advised that by reason of the fact that the applicant is a native of Alaska his enrollment at your school has to be made in accordance with Office regulations governing the admission of non-Indian children and children of unrestricted Indians of the Five Civilized Tribes at non-reservation schools, and consequently the Office cannot grant your request unless the applicant in question pays his tuition fee at your school.
