The Office has received your letter of November 28, 1910 and the application for enrollment of Daniel Bayhille, and notes also the enclosure from Principal Frissell of the Hampton Agricultural Institute.

In light of the information now furnished to the effect that this Indian boy is twenty-five years of age and not twenty-three as apparently he has stated and as he has been in attendance in government schools continuously since he was seven years old, it is evident that he should now be looking out for himself and earning a living. Therefore the office concurs in your recommendation and your action in not enrolling him is approved.

Please advise him of this decision.

Referring to Office letter of November the 23rd, granting authority for the enrolment at Carlisle of Daniel Bayhille, providing satisfactory to me, this is to inform the Office that it is not deemed advisable to grant such a privilege to this young man and he is being requested today to leave the school grounds.

I enclose herewith a copy of a letter that has also been received in connection with Bayhille's case. I agree with the principal of the Hampton Institute, and I believe it is not for the best interests of the young man and surely not for this school's best interest to enroll him here while he is in such relations with the management at Hampton.

My dear Mr. Friedman:

By the copy of The Arrow, just received, I see that Daniel Bayhille has recently been enrolled at Carlisle as a student in the business department.

Bayhille was graduated from Hampton in 1909, and spent last year in our business class. In the spring he went north for a vacation, and as his plans were not fully decided, he was retained on our list so that he might return if he desired, or might have his transportation to Pawnee if he wished to return home. Owing to Mr. Gleason's sudden death, and the consequent confusion as to what there was to be done, we did not find out definitely whether Bayhille intended to return or not, until it was too late to drop him September 30th. In fact we have never been told that he was not to return, as the letter of inquiry sent him about October first has never been answered - and he is still retained on our list. It was our intention to drop him at the end of the present quarter, and to make no claim for the time he was north, but we are to-day writing the Commissioner of Indian Affairs asking that he be dropped from our rolls at once, with no further expenses to the Government.

When Bayhille talked with Miss Andrus last spring he expressed a desire to enter the business college in Poughkeepsie

or Albany, to support himself, and no longer be dependent upon the Government. Our records show that he has one hundred dollars rent money annually, about eighty dollars annuity, and since June he has been earning twenty dollars a month and board at Mohonk, with perhaps another twenty dollars each month in tips. As he is twenty-five years old, and since the age of seven has been continuously in Government schools, it would seem as though he should now be fitted to earn his own living.
