James Walker was furnished transportation at Government expense for the reason that he desired to continue with the training that was begun while enrolled at the Mount Pleasant school in Michigan. There is some doubt about this boy's age, having been born in 1889, but he has been entered on our records as 21 years of age.

Thomas Iron is a full-blood member of the Sioux Tribe at Rosebud Agency, South Dakota. He was enrolled at Carlisle from 1907 to 1910, and returned to school at his own expense.

Charles Fish is a full-blood member of the Sioux Tribe located at Lower Brule, South Dakota. He was enrolled at Carlisle from 1905 to 1910 and returned to school at his own expense because he desired to graduate with his class, being a Senior at the present time.

Ammons Tramper is a full-blood member of the Cherokee Tribe in North Carolina. He came to Carlisle at his own expense, in order that he could be taught some trade that would be of benefit to him after his return to his home.

Peter Jordan is a full-blood member of the Chippewa Tribe at Red Lake, Minnesota. He was enrolled at Carlisle from 1907 to

1910, and he returned at no expense to the Government because he desired to get additional instruction in photography, which vocation he intends to follow as soon as he has mastered the details.

Robert Davis is a full-blood member of the Sac & Fox Tribe in Oklahoma. He was enrolled at Carlisle from 1905 to 1910, and he came back to Carlisle at his own expense to gain an additional year's experience in our carriage shop, so that he can go to work for himself.

Joseph Loudbear is a full-blood member of the Sioux Tribe at Standing Rock Agency, North Dakota. He graduated at Carlisle with the Class of 1910, but he returned to Carlisle to gain further experience in his chosen trade of painting. He returned to school at his own expense.

Clement Hill, a full-blood member of the Tuscarora Tribe in New York State returned to school at his own expense and asked to be given another chance. He had deserted from this school in 1907.

Clifford Taylor was transferred to Carlisle by Superintendent Nellis of the Pawnee Agency in Oklahoma, in order to afford him a chance to graduate. He is far enough advanced in his studies to make this possible in one additional school year.

Louis Island, a full-blood member of the Oneida Tribe in Wisconsin, came to Carlisle on September the 12th. Early in December a position was secured for him and his name was dropped from the school roll on December the 4th. As his transportation was not provided by the Government, it is desired that authority shall be granted for his enrollment during the time he was present at the school, from September 12th to December 4th.

Emma Jackson is a full-blood member of the Klamath Tribe. She came to Carlisle at her own expense from Washington, D.C. It has since been learned that she had gone there to secure a position, and thru some mistake the appointment could not be given her and she came on to Carlisle.

Lizzie Fish is a full-blood member of the Menominee Tribe in Wisconsin. She was enrolled at Carlisle from 1905 to 1910. She was furnished transportation at Government expense in order to give her the opportunity to continue her studies at the Academy of the Sacred Heart at Dumbarton, Washington, D. C.

David Priest was brought to Carlisle with a party of students from the Winnebago Agency in Nebraska. His traveling expenses were paid by his parents and he was sent here that he might be with his brother Henry, who was brought with the same party of students, and who is now enrolled here.

Alice Logan was furnished transportation from Warren, Pennsylvania to Carlisle, for it was believed that this could be done under the provisions of Paragraph No. X of Circular Letter No. 464. Alice was enrolled at Carlisle from 1905 to 1910, and is a desirable student in every way in spite of her age.



As the facts are not fully presented to the Office and as it seems that these students have been heretofore de facto enrolled, it is not thought that authority therefor should now be given by the Office. If any exception should be taken to your accounts, by reason of this matter, it can be brought to the attention of the Office again at that time.

It is proper to say however that your school should comply with the rules and should be careful not to admit students under fourteen or over 21 without authority therefor.
