He has been a good worker, has made fine progress in this department, and is perfectly able to take care of himself in any place by means of knowledge of his trade. Knowing this, and having become dissatisfied here, I believe he has a sincere desire to leave and strike out for himself".

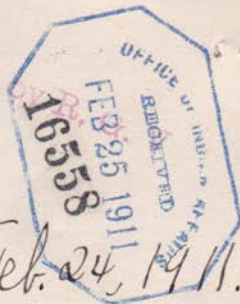

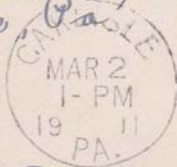
