

My friend:

The Office is in receipt of your letter without date, requesting to be advised if the Hopi pupils now enrolled at the Carlisle Indian School, will be returned to their homes this year.

In reply you are advised that these pupils were enrolled at the Carlisle School on January 26, 1907, for five year terms. Their terms of enrollment, therefore, in accordance with the rules of the Indian Office, will not terminate until after the close of the school term in June of 1912.

Superintendent Friedman of the Carlisle School advises that these Hopi pupils have made marked progress during the time of their stay at Carlisle; that they have been very desirable as students, and that they should be an influence for good among their own people after they are returned home at the close of their school terms.

In view of the excellent showing made by these children at Carlisle, and their desire to procure an education, the Office believes it unwise to authorise their return to their homes until they have finished their term of enrollment.

In keeping these Hopi pupils at Carlisle for.

another year, it is not the purpose of the Government to

make your people unhappy, but to show you that your children

must be educated that they may be able to take their places

with other citizens of the country.

The parents of these Carlisle students from your vicinity should not stand in the way of their children procuring that which will make them happier and better fitted to understand life and all of its conditions, by requesting that they be returned home before the expiration of their term of enrollment.
