In reply to this letter Mr. Greagor called at the school and reported that Isaac wook was sick in bed with measles. Mr. Greagor was instructed to keep him until he was thoroughly recovered. Isaac was recalled and sent home September 6,1911.

Sir:

I submit herewith the application covering the enrolment at Carlisle of the Isaac Cook referred to in Office letter of June the 9th. It is desired that the same be returned so that our files concerning the boy may be complete.

In this connection I beg leave to call attention to the fact that the boy was enrolled at Carlisle during my predecessor's administration and that there must have been unusual circumstances or he would not have been enrolled for such an unusual period of time. I want to add further that the boy does not desire to return to his home this year and for that reason the father was informed that the return home can not be effected this year. In case the boy had expressed a willingness to return home arrangements would have been completed to have him do so, regardless of the fact that he was regularly enrolled for the ten year

period indicated by the application for his enrolment.

In view of the fact therefore that the boy is receiving training that will be of use to him and for the
reason that he does not want to return to his home, I recommend that the conditions agreed to on the application for
enrolment be complied with and that the boy be required to
remain here until the termination of his original period
of enrolment or until such time that he shall request permission to spend a vacation at his home.
