Madam:

The Office has your letter of June 29, 1911, urging that your son be allowed to reenroll at the Carlisle School, Pennsylvania, in order to complete his industrial course there.

Concerning his ineligibility you are informed that, before instructions were issued to exclude your son Willard from the Carlisle School, one of the Supervisors of the Indian Office visited that place and obtained information which, in the opinion of the Office, justified Willard's exclusion.

Your son is reported to be 18 years of age, is white and came from 2130 Monroe Street, Evanston, Illinois, where he attended school for several years before entering Carlisle. Willard told the Supervisor that his

mother is part Indian, having been born in Colorado, but does not know how much Indian blood is claimed. He said also that you are the owner of several hundred acres of land in the State of Colorado.

Since it is now the policy of the Office to exclude from Indian schools those pupils who of themselves
or because of their parentage are well able to support
themselves and gain an education without Government assistance, the Office is limiting enrollment to those Indian pupils who are beyond question entitled to such privileges.

The Office regrets the disappointment that must come to you because of this policy of exclusion, but is well satisfied that the best interests of the Indians justify the arrangement.
