Craighead of 56 Linden Avenue, Lansdowne, Pennsylvania, is Adeline Boutang, and that she is one of those girls who has been declared ineligible for further enrolment at Carlisle. As directed in Office letters of May 16th and June 10th her return home will have to be effected this month.



Adeline Boutang is a quarter-blood member of the Chippewa Tribe and she is now 19 years of age. She was enrolled here from Cass Lake, Minnesota, on September the 23rd of 1906, and was re-enrolled on September the 16th of 1909. She is a member of this year's Senior Class and has had two years of experience as a nurse in our school hospital. It was being planned to arrange for her to take up work in a hospital training school for nurses just as soon as she had

completed the course at this school. She is a girl of excellent character, has been steady in her work and appreciative of her educational opportunities, and has given indications of becoming a splendid nurse.

here or in the West & graduate as  
a trained nurse. She is anxious  
to remain with me for the winter  
and has received the consent of  
her parents to do so. I shall take

she still remained under the  
school rules & will either get  
her entered into a hospital here  
or see her safely on her way West  
after she is through with me.  
She comes from Cass Lake Minn.  
Do hope this will be thoroughly  
satisfactory and that I may hear  
soon positively that she can remain  
with me. You see one is so  
helpless with one invalid on ones  
hands - and I want to feel settled  
as I can not get along without  
a nurse at all.
