24, 1911. All these letters show that James Martin is not very well but is not very sick. It is evident that he is receiving the best care and attention possible at the school and his health is in no immediate danger. The last report from the school, which came a few days ago, says this:

"James Mertin is in fair condition. He has lost some weight. We are having him eat at the hospital so that he can get eggs and milk and so that he may come back to his normal weight. At present I can not recommend that he be sent home on account of sickness."

As the Office thinks that James is doing very well where he is and will probably not improve if sent home, it concludes for that reason to let him remain at Carlisle.


