To the Indian Commissioner

I write to see if you
can help my boy out he
is a graduate of the Carlisle
Indians having graduated
this last April he was the
salutary of his class and
has a good record at that
School.

It was his plans to re-
main there and go out
under the outing system for
the summer and help him-
self through the Preparatory
School Conway Hall at
Carlisle but unfortunately
he was taken with an

acute attack of appendicitis
and they had to put him
through a very serious op-
eration as the appendix was
ruptured and had got into
a very bad state his general
health is very good but Dr
Allen at Carlisle said he
would always be weak and
that he was fortunate to be
living I was very grateful
to all the employees at the Hospital
and they done everything that
could be done for him he was
operated on just 1 week from
the day he graduated and
the Dr said he could not
do any thing this summer
so I took him home with
me.

Now he is anxious to enter
Cunsey Hall and so I write

to see if he could be allowed to
re-enter the Indians School to
attend Conway Hall. I don't
feel hardly able to send him
as we have had a great deal
of sickness and trouble and
only have our earnings from
week to week so it would be
a great strain so if you
would consider this favor
and I would be pleased to

hear from you owing to the
illness Alfred will never
be able to do any hard work
so he wants to fit himself for
a position by educating himself
further. his name is
Alfred L DeGrasse.
