The Office has your letter of September 11, 1911, and the enclosure from the Superintendent of the Carlisle School, Pennsylvania, with reference to the enrollment there of your grandson.

His transfer to Carlisle is not possible at the present time because he is considered too young to enter the Carlisle School as now organized. Furthermore, the law provides that no pupil under fourteen years of age shall be transported to a school beyond the state in which he lives or the adjoining state at Government expense.

The Office believes that it will be a good plan to arrange for his enrollment at one of the schools near his home where his age and other circumstances would permit, and then perhaps when he becomes old enough, go to Carlisle or some other large nonreservation school.

In the absence of my daughter
Phoebe Brown Low, a widow - I write to ask
that you grant permission to send my grand-
child to the school at Carlisle. The boy
is going on ten years of age, and is
healthy, bright and active, and is large
for his age. He is enrolled as an ammu-
nition at Sisseton Agency, S. D. My daugh-
ter would like to send her boy to Car-
lisle as she herself was educated there
and her sister as well as her brother
graduated there ^{also}. The boy needs school-
ing, but as ~~she~~ ^{can} my daughter can-
not afford to send him elsewhere he is
in danger of growing up in ignorance.

My dear Madam:-

I have given the contents of your letter of August the 16th my careful consideration, but for the reason that the Indian Office will not allow me to enroll students at Carlisle who are less than fourteen years of age, I cannot give you permission to send your boy to Carlisle. I beg leave to suggest, however, that you write to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs at Washington, D. C., and that you state clearly why it is necessary that your boy should be enrolled at some school. If permission is granted you from the Office for the enrollment I will be pleased to receive the boy as a student here. However, I must add that you will have to provide transportation to Carlisle in case authority is granted for your son's enrollment.

I regret that such a reply has to be made to your letter but it is hoped you will yet succeed in arranging for your son's education.
