The records show that this boy was a pupil at the Carlisle School from November 8, 1908, to July 21, 1909, at which time he was dropped from the rolls. On December 6, 1911, he asked to be enrolled again at Carlisle in order to attend a commercial school in the town of Carlisle. This matter was given consideration, and upon recommendation of the Superintendent, the request was denied by this Office December 11, 1911. On December 18, 1913, another request, through Mr. Hamilton, for his enrollment was received and the Office advised Mr. Hamilton that should Henry Sutton now wish to be enrolled at Carlisle for the purpose of remaining there and taking the school course the matter would be given consideration.

Sir:

Referring to Office letter of November the 14th this is to report that Henry Sutton was enrolled at this school from September the 8th of 1906 to June the 2nd of 1908, and again from November the 8th of 1908 to July the 21st of 1909. On the last mentioned date he was allowed to return to his home for a visit and since that time his name has been dropped from the school rolls.

I must report further that Henry Sutton is a cripple and that he has to use a crutch. This prevents him from performing the ordinary duties required of all boys and makes it impossible for him to join other students in the organized moving from place to place that is so essential to maintain order and discipline.

For the reasons above enumerated I believe it would be inadvisable to re-enroll Henry at Carlisle, and for the



I am writing to find out something about the education of the Indian.

I have been trying to obtain a good education at many different places and have succeeded in graduating from a small boarding school in this state and would now like to take a commercial course in one of the high schools here through the State appropriation, but the education dept. at Albany will not let me have the appropriation, for the commercial course but will let a person have it to take a teachers course at the Normal, but as I am a cripple I could not teach school very well. I have applied to Carlisle but as I am not

able to take part with the rest of the boys, they would not take me, I was there 3 years, but left for a school nearer home, where I graduated from this spring.

I thought maybe you could fix it up for me, so that I may take a course here of that I might go to Barlick and attend the schools in town and make my home at the Barlick Indian School which I would like to do.

Hoping that you can give me a little help in this matter, I wait for an early reply, from
