The Office has received your letter of January 19, 1912, making application for the enrollment at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, of your ward, Charles E. Stuck, of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

It is now and has been for some time the policy of the Indian Office not to enroll in Government Indian schools pupils who have access to suitable public schools at home, and in accordance with this policy it seems that your ward can avail himself of the educational facilities furnished by the State and therefore ought not to be enrolled in the Government schools.

The request is, therefore, denied unless it shall be clearly shown either that he is practically deprived of the opportunity of attending the public schools or the public school in his community does not furnish him adequate educational facilities. In order that there may be more information in reference to this matter, please inform the Office what your occupation is, your approximate annual income, number of members

in your family dependent upon you for support, the distance you live from the public school to which your ward is sent; also the size of the school, number of grades taught, enrollmont, number of teachers, etc.

In the application blank which you submitted you did not state in what grade he was in the public school. The application also indicates that he desires to attend an Indian school because his schoolmates, being of the white race. virtually ostracized him because he is an Indian. Will you please inficate more fully the nature of the treatment that your ward receives from his schoolmates.

It may be necessary for the Office to secure further information, and for this purpose it would like to have the names and addresses of the teacher or principal of the school and the director of the Board of Education.

Upon receipt of this information the matter will bo given immediate consideration.

INDORSEMENT.

A child showing one-sixteenth or less Indian blood, whose parents live on an Indian reservation, Indian fashion, who, if debarred from the Government schools, could not obtain an education, may be permitted in the reservation day and boarding schools, but it is preferable that it be not transferred to a nonreservation school, without permission from the Office. Children showing one-eighth or less Indian blood, whose parents do not live on an Indian reservation, whose home is among white people where there are churches and schools, who are presumed to have adopted the white man's manners and customs, and are to all intents and purposes white people, are debarred from enrollment in the Government nonreservation and reservation schools. Superintendents, in all cases where doubt exists as to the degree of Indian blood of a child proposed for transfer, should fully satisfy themselves of the facts by affidavits from reliable persons, which affidavits must be kept on file at the school.

A pupil who has been regularly enrolled in a nonreservation school must not be taken to any other nonreservation school without the consent of both Superintendents and the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and Superintendents will be held to strict accountability for such pupils taken to their schools.

A pupil dismissed from school for cause must not be enrolled in any other school without the permission of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs. Full facts must be submitted with each request.
