Dear Doctor:-

Reply to your communication of the 4th instant with regard to the condition of the Indian students under treatment has been unavoidably delayed. Concerning the case of Mamie Rose would say that she was discharged on the 6th instant, and other than very slight impairment over the right apex there were no physical signs of pulmonary tuberculosis at the time of discharge. Her temperature, pulse and respiration were approximately normal with a gain in weight of 25 1/2 pounds. Since admission seven examinations of the sputum have been made, the last five of which were made at intervals of one month with negative results for tubercle bacilli. She was classified as an incipient case upon admission and discharged with the disease "arrested".

Concerning Catherine Crowd, classified as moderately advanced, would say that she is also an "arrested" case at this time and we believe in condition for discharge. Since admission she has made a gain in weight of 13 pounds, her temperature has been normal for the past three months, with variation in the pulse of from 80 to 90. She does not cough or expectorate and has had six negative examinations of the sputum for tubercle bacilli.

Wallace Hanks, classified as a moderately advanced case, has made

satisfactory progress although on account of some slight activity at the apices of both lungs it was deemed advisable to discontinue the tuberculine treatment during the first week in December. He has some laryngeal involvement which is receiving proper treatment. Admission weight = 131 3/4 pounds, present weight = 160.
