Sir:

The father of Rosa Lyons, a Chippewa of the Mississippi band, enrolled at your school from White Oak Point, Minnesota, is in the City and wishes very much to see his daughter before returning home.

As he is unable to stand the expense of a visit to the school or to pay the daughter's way to Washington, it has occurred to the Office that perhaps the girl may have sufficient funds to her credit at the school to pay her expenses to this City and return.

If she has sufficient funds to cover her entire expenses for a day's visit here, and if in your judgment it is safe for her to make the journey without escort, you may excuse Rosa Lyons from school duty for this purpose.

Please advise the Office of the action you take in this matter.
