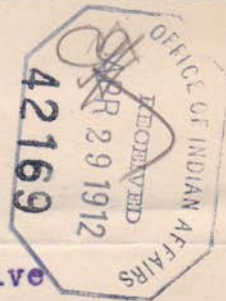

Referring to Office letter of April the 8th,  
I respectfully report that William Foster spent two  
years in the academic department at this school and had  
one year in a public school in Philadelphia since the  
time he was enrolled at Carlisle.

When he went to live with the family of Mr. C.  
F. Eckert, Chief Train Despatcher of the New York Division  
of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway to take up the  
machinist's trade under our Outing System he gave up his  
school work, but since then he has devoted some time to  
studying at night. He took up his trade in the shops of  
the Philadelphia and Reading Railway in Philadelphia and  
he completed the trade last year. He is now earning regu-  
lar journeyman's wages in the same shops.


