Reporting as was directed in Office letter of August the 26th I respectfully state that George W. Cushing was born at Unga, Alaska, on August the 1st, 1895. His father, Geo. A. Cushing, is a white man. The mother, Mrs. Christina Cushing, is a full-blood member of the Aleute Tribe.

The young man was brought to Carlisle by the William W. Foster who has been mentioned in a number of communications to the Office, and without any expense whatever to the government.

Sir:

I respectfully transmit herewith a letter that has been received from Mr. W. F. Eckert, the Chief Train Despatcher of the New York Division of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway. Mr. Eckert has been an outing patron for a number of years and has always been willing to assist the school in any way possible to arrange for the training of boys and to use his influence in securing positions for them after their period of such training.

The Wm. Foster mentioned is an Alaskan Indian who came to Carlisle in 1902. In a very few years after that he went to Mr. Eckert's home under our Outing System. Arrangements were completed soon after that for him to take up the machinist's trade in the Reading Railway Shops and when he left here this spring to go to his home he was earning from \$75.00 to \$100.00 a month as a full fledged



journeyman machinist. He expects to return to Philadelphia to continue with his work in the shops where he received his training.
