Sir:

Referring to your letter of September 28 relative to the request of Don Hardy for the enrollment of his son at the Carlisle School, you are advised that as this boy is less than one-fourth Indian blood and, from the correspondence, apparently has public school facilities, his case comes within the law as set out in Circular #679.

It does not seem, according to the spirit of the law, that he should be enrolled in an Indian school unless he is denied admission to the public schools. If, however, he is without public school facilities, then the Office will consider his application for enrollment in some non-reservation school; but in such an event it is believed he should attend a school nearer his home.

Sir:

Returning herewith letter of Don Hardy, addressed to your Office and referred here for report, I have the honor to report that, upon request of Mr. Hardy, that arrangements be made for the admission of his son to the Carlisle School, I wrote the Superintendent, Mr. Friedman, advising him as to the degree of Indian blood of the applicant, and was informed that they could not receive a pupil of less than one-fourth Indian blood. I then wrote the Superintendents of Haskell Institute and Sherman Institute, both of whom declined to receive the boy, on the same ground. These letters were forwarded to Mr. Hardy.

Sch
As Mr. Hardy's son is of less than one-fourth degree of Indian blood he would appear to come under the proviso to the ~~item~~ item of the act of August 24th, 1912, appropriating moneys for Indian Education, and providing that no part of same should be used for the education of Indians of less than one-fourth Indian blood. See your circular of September 6, 1912, No. 679.
