Dear Sir:-

I am writing to you concerning the admission of my daughter aged fifteen into the Carlisle Indian School at Carlisle Pa. I spoke to you about the matter last October in Columbus O. during the Convention of the Society of American Indians, and you suggested that I write you setting forth the facts which are as follows:- I am of mixed white and Osage blood, never having lived on that reservation but was raised with the Kiowas. I am a Presbyterian Clergyman and an active member of the Society of American Indians. I made an address at the Commencement exercises of Carlisle school last year, and am invited to do the same this year. I state this to let you know that I am personally known to Mr. Freidman the Superintendent.

One of my reasons for wanting my daughter to enter the school is that she might not only have the benefit of that splendid school under the efficient superintendency of Mr. Frieidman, but that as I am a lecturer on the American Indian, and am often on Indian reservations working amongst them, it would give me a very vital contact with them to have a child in the school.

If you will kindly let me know how she can be admitted she not being a half blood, and will give me any other information concerning the matter I shall greatly appreciate it.
