Hon. Scott Ferris has requested the Office to advise you directly concerning your request for the enrollment of your son in the Carlisle Indian School.

It has been an invariable rule of the Indian Service not to enroll in the Carlisle School members of the Five Civilized Tribes, Oklahoma, except in cases where such applicants desire to enter on the basis of non-Indian pupils--that is to say, by paying tuition and also their own transportation to and from the school. The charge for tuition at Carlisle is \$167 per annum.

If your son is a non-restricted member of the Five Civilized Tribes, as appears from your letter, the same rule would apply to Haskell Institute, Lawrence, Kansas, and the Chilocco Indian School, Chilocco, Oklahoma. If, however, you wish your son to enter Carlisle, or one of the other schools mentioned, upon the conditions which are indicated above, you can address a letter to the Superintendent of any of these schools and he will give you any further information or assistance which you desire.
