In reference to the enrollment of a boy by the name of Milford Henderson in that school, he informs me that you are desirous of learning more definite news concerning the boy before you sanction such an enrollment .may I add that this boy is soon to be without the support of his parents owing to the fact that the father and mother are soon to separate and there will be no way of arranging for him to continue in the public schools here in Salt bake City I have consulted the State Superintendent Mr Nelson and he has advised that I write you a letter of explanation stating that it will be impossible for the boy to continue here owing to the separation .the parents have drifted out here from the Stockbridge Reservation and the mother is a most deserving woman but cannot support the boy owing to her poor health, she is trying to save up transportation to get back to her people on the Reservation.

I am a Missionery here on the field and am in a position to supply you with all necessary information, your early consideration will be appreciated Verytruly yours.


