Sir:

Referring to the application of Edward Paul Bauer for enrollment in the Carlisle School, the information mentioned in Office letter of July 31 does not appear in the correspondence which you have forwarded. Probably your advice to Mrs. Floyd was correct, viz: that the boy had public school facilities at his home and should not be received at Carlisle, and this view should be adhered to unless further information shall be presented to the Office which shows clearly that he has not public school facilities and is entitled to receive an education at government expense.

It does not appear from the present correspondence that he is denied access to the public schools and while the family is poor, yet this is true of many citizens, white or Indian, who do not receive government assistance.

I have received your letter of recent date and the card that was also addressed to me in regard to the enrolment at Carlisle of your brother, Edward Paul Bauer. I regret that this reply to your communications has been so long delayed, but it was advisable to hold the same over until a decision was received regarding the enrolment of another boy whose eligibility was in doubt. The decision that has been made by the office is to the effect that the boy cannot be received at Carlisle, and in view of the fact that your brother is also a resident of a city I would not be justified in receiving him. As I am not living on or near a reservation I am unacquainted with many Indians.

However I have a Half brother Edward Paul Bauer who is very anxious to enter the school I have talked about so much. He will be 15 years old next November. Lively and hearty and has never seen a real sick day since he was 18 months old when he got hurt in some way and caught cold which settled in one limb he was ill two years during which time the limb did not keep pace with

the r' in growth and is about
two inches shorter, it does not seem
to trouble him at all for he is
a leader in all boyish games
Base Ball, running, jumping he
seems to do as easily as the rest.
He wears a cork sole of course and
is so active that his shoes alone
cost us \$5.00 per mo. His father
is only a laborer and can not
keep him in school much long-
er. We have the same mother
from whom we inherit Oneida
Indian blood of which we are
quite proud having descended
from a princess. (Mary Ann Denny)
Another boy is Lloyd Kindness
Brotherston, living at fuddu-
lac Okis. I do not know his
house number. Please let us

Dear Sir; - I am in receipt
of a letter from W. Friedman
the Superintendent of Carlisle
which I will inclose.

I do not think that the reasons
given against my brother's
admittance to that school
are sufficient to bar him
from the privileges of the
school. I am writing to you
with hope of still gaining these
privileges for one who sorely
needs an education for he is
a cripple as far as heavy work
is concerned. He is not sick
but joins the boys in all their
sports and is a bright healthy

boy. His mother has struggled for years to keep her children clothed and in school but she can not do so any longer because of age and failing health. The father is a helpless sort who ~~fully~~ scarcely pays his own living. My husband is hardly able to support a growing family of his own. I know that there are a number of Orsage children at this school whose parents are wealthy and who could send their children to a private school if they wished.

My mother has four children who will have to be sent out to homes wherever they can be found for they are very poor. As Indians we ask you
Help.

My oldest brother and myself enjoyed the priviledges of the Carlisle school having been sent there from an Indian school at Wittenberg, O. is.

I know what my young brother will lose should you fail to admit him. Mr. Friedman has my letter asking the for the priviledge of sending the boy there. If you need any further information I am only too glad to give it to you. I close

hoping to hear from you at the earliest possible date for something must be done and Paul will no longer have the priviledges of a city school.
