My dear Sir:

FILED BY C. P. F. This morning our visiting school physician made me a report as follows in regard to the condition of Joseph Chief Ragle's health:

> "Joseph Chief Eagle since his arrival has been more or less an inmate of the Hospital. He has at various times outbreaks of cutaneous tuberculosis, at present he has tubercular ulcers of the right eye lid and of the neck. I think this boy would do better at home in the open air than at school. I therefore recommend he be sent home."

In accordance with this recommendation it is being arranged to have him leave here tomorrow evening. accompanied by another boy who is enroute to the Sisseton Agency. Joseph has requested that transportation to the Rosebud Agency be furnished him so that he can visit you before he goes on to his home. Such action is being taken.
