Upon receipt of Office letter of July the 31st, relative to the condition of Annie B. Cole's health, the same was referred to our Girls' Outing Agent with a request that a report be made in regard to the complaints made by the girl and her father. Our records indicate that the girl has lost some weight since January of this year, but when it is taken into consideration that she was then wearing her heavy clothes and that she has not been complaining it is believed that she should not be given permission to return home because of the condition of her health.
