Sir:

I respectfully report that the Office's letter of September the 17th was referred to Mr. Denny, the assistant disciplinarian who has had charge of the quarters where Darius Schenandore was cared for during his stay at Carlisle. Mr. Denny has submitted a statement as copied below:

"Referring to the case of Darius Skenandore, who has asked for enrolment, I refer you to my letter dated August 30, 1913, in which I recommend that he be refused admission. I say "Darius has served two terms, eight years in all. He is a chronic thief".

He had been stealing at different times ever since he has been at Carlisle. He was in the guard-house for stealing within five months before he left for his home last June.

If he is far enough advanced in his trade to be able to work with an outside firm, he can find work in the towns near his home. It seems to me that Carlisle has done all it can for him and that his place here should be given to a more deserving fellow."
