Sir:

Referring to the Office's letter of March the 9th, in regard to an inquiry that has been made by Mrs. Rose Collins of Rosebush, Michigan, about a reimbursement for the amount she expended in sending her children to Carlisle, this is to report that the children seem to have been sent here without authority when there was some question about their eligibility. After their arrival at this school special authority was granted by the Office to keep them, because they had been sent on at personal expense.

Under the circumstances it is my belief that a reimbursement should not be made, and I respectfully so recommend.
