Sir:

I respectfully transmit herewith written communications that have been handed to me by the Matron
of the School, written by two of the girls now enrolled
here, and I recommend that authority be granted me to
expel them from this school with the understanding that
they cannot be enrolled at any other Indian School.

Lucinda Welch is a 3/4 blood member of the Cherokee Tribe in North Carolina, now mineteen years of age. She was enrolled at this school on March the 18th of this year. During the month of June she had deserted from an Outing home to which she had been allowed to go for the summer months, and only after a long search was she found and returned to school. Since her return to school she has practiced further misconduct. She is a bad influence and should be removed.

Marie Le Sieur was enrolled at this school on Movem-

ber the 6th of 1911. She is a 3/8 blood member of the Paiute Tribe and was sent here by the Superintendent of the Fort Hall School in Idaho. She is now eighteen years of age.

During the time she has been enrolled here she has been generally unmagageable in spite of all efforts that have been put forth to assist her to improve. This week she deserted from an Outing home where one more chance was being given her in the home of a patron whose best care could be depended on, and is now confined under the Matron's jurisdiction of the Detective Bureau in the City of Philadelphia for safe keeping, in which city she was apprehended at my request.

Because of the fact that these two girls cannot be kept here as students it is respectfully requested that I be authorized to send them to their homes as soon as it can possibly be arranged.
