I respectfully report that Mary Shomin, who is referred to in the communication I return to the Office herewith, was entitled to return to her home in June because of her period of enrolment having terminated. She elected to remain at Carlisle to continue with her training as a pupil nurse at our school hospital.

When, in July, she desired to go to her home I did not have funds to my credit from which transportation could be provided for her.

It has now been arranged so that Mary can leave here for her home tomorrow evening, August the 25th, and transportation will be provided for her at government expense.

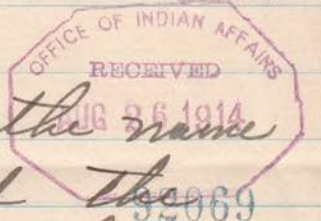

Oulish Indian School for one full
term of five years.

This young lady wishes to
come home to her mother, but somehow
she has trouble in securing her
transportation from the Gov't. She
is entitled to her passage and I
believe you ought to see that she comes
home owing to the expiration of her
five year term.

I have been asked by the girl
above named to make her a loan of
Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) with which to pay
her expenses. Knowing that her term
has expired I don't see any necessity
for me to send her the amount she
desires.



Kindly inform me what is to
be done in regards to this
matter. I understand ^{that} the situation
of the Indian School is somewhat
unbalanced or is subject to some
trouble.
