The Office is in receipt of a letter from Mr. M. J. Lewis, on behalf of your son Bud Walker, who desires to attend the Carlisle Indian School, but who, being only one-sixteenth Cherokee, is required by the rules of the Service to pay from his own funds both his tuition fee and transportation. The Office takes an interest in all the ambitious Indian boys and girls who desire the benefits of the large nonreservation schools, but does not feel that it can with justice deprive those of a larger degree of Indian blood, who many times require more assistance in fitting themselves for life, in order to admit young men like your son who have only a small degree of Indian blood. As you live in Tulsa, and your son appears quite well advanced in his studies, it appears that he is shout ready to enter the high school. The Office always favors the enrollment

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of Indian pupils in the public schools wherever possible, believing it is greatly to the advantage of the Indian. It is hoped your son will enter the public schools in Tulsa, and if possible attend the high school and make a good record there.
