BY C. P. F. I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of the above noted communication and with reference thereto state that the three children mentioned by Appletree are Susie, Carrie and Lucien Rice aged respectively 15, 11 and 6 years.

Their mother is dead but their father is living though he is a worthless individual and the children are being cared for by relatives during vacation. They attend the boarding school here when school is in session.

The oldest one is not at all bright though she can attend the Agency school with profit to herself. She might do better at a school for the feeble minded though I very much doubt it.

The other two are entirely too young to attend a non-reservation school and as their interests do not in my judgement demand it I have not thought it best to so recommend.

Appletree is but very little better than the father of the children about whom he writes.

He has taken up the matter of the transfer of these children with this office two or three times and each time I have advised him that I thought the children were alright here. The letter is returned herewith.
