Sir:

Reporting as was requested in the Office's letters of January 14th and 28th relative to the eligibility for enrolment at Carlisle of Louis White, I respectfully state that the young man claims three-fourths degree of Indian blood for each of his parents. The record of his former enrolment at Carlisle does not specify any definite degree of Indian blood for his parents and his own as but one-fourth.

Louis claims further that his parents are in fairly comfortable circumstances but that they cannot contribute in any way toward securing an education for him if he is not given permission to continue with his enrolment here.

My Friend:

Referring further to your communication of November 14, requesting enrollment of Louis White in the Carlisle Indian School, it appears that this young man is over 21 years of age, and I am advised that he desires to devote his time in the school to academic work solely and not to vocational training.

If so, it seems that little could be gained by him at the school that would be of use and benefit to one of his age. The only justification for his entering Carlisle would be in order to fit himself for some calling which would be the means of his earning a living after he leaves the school. Under the circumstances it would not be wise to enroll him.

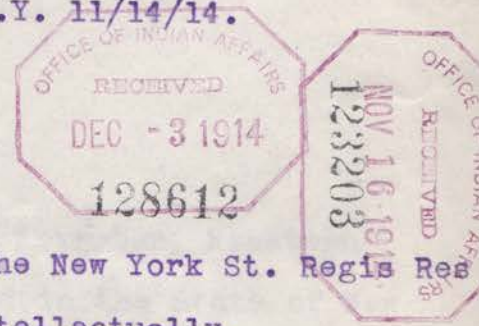
