Reporting as was requested in the Office's letters of January 14th and 28th relative to the eligibility for enrolment at Carlisle of Louis White. I respectfully state that the young man claims three-fourths degree of Indian blood for each of his parents. The record of his former enrolment at Carlisle does not specify any definite degree of Indian blood for his parents and his own as but onefourth.

Louis claims further that his parents are in fairly comfortable circumstances but that they cannot contribute in any way toward securing an education for him if he is not given permission to continue with his enrolment here.
