The Office has your letter of Oct. 20, and accompanying papers of four applicants for enrollment at the Carlisle School who were born in the vicinity of Charenton, La., and requesting to be advised what consideration should be given these applications.

While these Indians are citizens and entitled to public school privileges, it may be that they are still in need of Government aid. Under the circumstances, I wish you would look into each case separately and if, in your judgment, they are worthy and cannot receive an education unless given an opportunity to enroll at Carlisle, you may take them into your school.

As he now claims to be a Chickasaw and some of the other applicants "of the Charenton Tribe" I respectfully request that I be advised what consideration may be given the applications.

Several students from Charenton are now enrolled here and are proving themselves worthy in every way of being given a chance to acquire an education.
