Sir:

Complying with the request contained in the Office's letter of November the 20th, with which was enclosed a letter from Mr. Philip Romero of Pine Ridge Agency regarding his son Manuel, I respectfully report that when Manuel Romero returned to Carlisle in September for an additional period of enrolment it was found that he had contracted a venereal disease. He was treated for the trouble and cured, but since then he has made a determined effort to cause just as much trouble as possible and evidently nothing more can be done for him here. I respectfully refer you to my letter to Superintendent Brennan on October the 30th, copy of which is attached hereto, together with copies of two other letters that were written regarding Manuel's case.

Because I believe that the government's money should not be expended to transport so unruly a boy I recommend that whatever funds the boy has to his credit should be



used to reimburse the government for what has already been expended to bring him to Carlisle and what will have to be expended to get him to his home. As he is not doing himself any good here arrangements will be made to send him home, but I yet insist that he should repay the government as is recommended above.

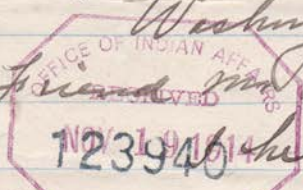

Sir:

We have received a letter from the Carlisle School which recommends the return of Manuel to this reservation. It seems that his record at the school thus far this year is nowhere near as good as it was last year, and the school authorities are much disappointed in his conduct since returning. They have tried to make him see that he should do better, but he is not willing to try and improve. Mr. Lipps, Supervisor in Charge, in his letter, writes that " he refuses to go to school or to do anything he is told to do, and shirks every duty and responsibility that is placed upon him".

His health, too, is poor.

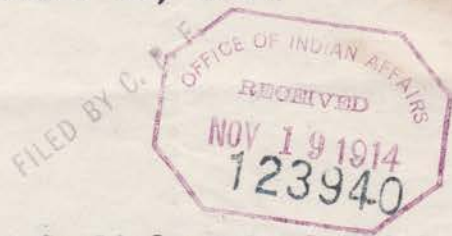
Mr. Lipps further writes, " I hardly think it would be a proper charge for the Government to pay his expenses home under these circumstances, as the fault is all his own, and he refuses to cooperate with us to improve his conduct".

In view of all the above, you should ask for the return of Manuel from the school, and see that money is provided for expenses from the the school to Pine Ridge.



I enclose a letter received from Phillip Romero, a member of the Pine Ridge band of Sioux Indians, Pine Ridge Agency, S. D., dated November 14, 1914.

Mr. Romero encloses a letter from Mr. John E. Brennan, Superintendent of Pine Ridge Agency, in which he reports that the Superintendent of Carlisle Indian School has notified him that Romero's boy at Carlisle should be sent home as he will not observe the rules of the School and that his health is poor.

Mr. Romero writes that he is not able to pay the expense of bringing his boy back to Pine Ridge as suggested by the Superintendent at Carlisle, and desires assistance of the Government to meet the necessary expenses in the case.

The plea of Mr. Romero is respectfully referred to your Bureau for consideration. Possibly this boy's physical condition may have had an influence upon him to the extent that his disobedience has resulted. I know nothing of the facts in the case.
