With further reference to your letter of November 25, in behalf of George Clarke of Waterville, New York, who wishes to be enrolled at Carlisle Indian School, you are informed that in a communication from the Supervisor in Charge of the school, dated December 19, the Office is advised that the sister of this young man who is now at Carlisle claims that George has not lived at home for the past four years, and that she knows very little about him except that he has come home only for very brief periods. Mr. Lipps also says that in view of the fact that Mr. Louis P. Clarke of 516 Kossuth Ave., Utica, New York, and Frank Clarke of 323 Jay St., Utica, New York, are both brothers of this young man and have indicated by correspondence with him that they can be depended upon to look after their younger brother, it is believed his plight should be reported to them.

Sir:

Upon receipt of the Office's letter of December the 11th, to which was attached a communication from the Assistant Secretary of The Federated Charities of Baltimore, Maryland, in behalf of one George Clark who desires to be enrolled at Carlisle, the sister of the young man, who is enrolled here, was questioned regarding him. She claims that he has not lived at home for the past four years and that she knows very little about him except that he has come home only for very brief periods.

In view of the fact that Mr. Louis P. Clarke of 516 Kossuth Ave., Utica, N. Y., and Frank Clarke of 323 Jay St., Utica, N. Y., both brothers of the young man referred to, have indicated by correspondence I have had with them that they can be depended on to look after their younger brother ~~if he is worthy~~ I respectfully recommend that their brother's plight be reported to them. If it is then

learned that the boy's record has been at all satisfactory I shall gladly co-operate in effecting his enrolment at Carlisle.


In this connection I beg leave to report that a special effort has been made this year to enrol only a selected class of students who are worthy, and as it has been the experience of former Superintendents at Carlisle that very little is to be done for boys who have roved from place to place unrestrained I respectfully request that the young man whose desire to enroll at Carlisle is now under consideration give definite assurance that he is to be trusted before favorable consideration be given his application.

Several days ago, we wrote you with reference to an Indian by the name of Sam Nelson and to the present writing, we have heard nothing from you. This man has now left Baltimore and gone to Philadelphia. If you wish to have his present address, I can furnish it to you.

We would like to call your attention to the case of an Indian boy by the name of George Clark, 18 years of age, who claims that he was born in Waterville, N. Y., his father's and mother's name was Joseph and Louisa Clark, his father lives at 516 Kowwuth Ave., Utica, N. Y. and his mother at 457 Court St., Watertown.

He further states that they are from the ST. Regis Reservation in New York state and that he is anxious to take up a course of training at the Indian School at Carlisle, Pa. He says that his sister is now a student there.

Will you kindly advise us, at your earliest convenience, what can be done relative to his going there to school.
