Referring to your letter of September 13 recommending that the age limit be waived in the case of Amos Sackatook, a Menominee Indian, 22 years of age, and he be permitted to enter the Carlisle School, you are advised that the Office is in receipt of a letter from Superintendent Lipps also recommending that this young man be permitted to enroll at that school in case he demonstrates his sincerity of purpose by earning money to pay his transportation to the school.

In view of the circumstances set out in your letter and that of Superintendent Lipps, the Office will approve the enrollment of this over age pupil in case he earns the necessary amount and pays his own transportation expenses to the school.

Sir:

Upon receiving a copy of the letter Superintendent A. S. Nicholson of the Keshena Indian School addressed to the Office from Neopit, Wisconsin, on the 13th instant in behalf of Amos Sackatuck, it was learned that in 1913 Amos was a deserter from Carlisle for a period of about five months. It is shown further in our records that he worked in the Menominee Mills until he had earned enough money to pay for his return transportation and that he later completed satisfactorily his period of enrolment.

In view of the fact that the young man has been in trouble since his return home was effected in 1914 it is believed only fair that he should take the additional time he will require to accumulate what will again be needed to pay for his transportation to Carlisle. It will afford him an opportunity to show further his sincerity of purpose and if he can come only as a result of his own efforts it should make of him a better student when he can come. A place will be re-



Sir:

Amos Sackatook, a Menominee Indian, male, age 22, desires opportunity to attend Carlisle Indian School to finish education and take up industrial training, such as plumbing trade. He attended this school previously, finishing his term in 1914, when he returned to the reservation.

There are no chances here in line of industry he desires and expresses belief that another term at Carlisle and its influence will perfect him so as to be self-supporting. He is a strong, able lad, has ability if directed aright. He fell into bad habit of drinking on his return, due to bad influence of his home, for which he suffered punishment, and he expresses desire to get away where he can make a man of himself.


He has no individual Indian money of his own but if transportation could not be allowed him, could go to work and earn same. Naturally this would take time.

Each
In view of his expressed good intentions, I recommend that age limit in his case be waived and that permission to enter Carlisle School be granted, providing his record there was such as to commend
