In the Office's letter of November 4th, 1915, marked as is noted above, I was instructed to take steps to have guardians and parents of students named therein make arrangements to have such young people educated elsewhere than at Carlisle. On December the 10th, 1915, in a letter marked "Ed-Schools, 127459-15, A V S", I was authorized to keep such students on the rolls for the present.

Among the number mentioned was Winifred Lajeunesse, about whose home conditions Superintendent Norris of the Shoshone Agency at Fort Washakie, Wyoming, has just written me as follows:

"I am in receipt of a letter from Mr. J. D. DeHuff, Acting Superintendent, dated December 14, 1915, requesting that a full and complete statement be given regarding Winnifred Lajeunesse now a pupil in your school.

Replying thereto beg to state that this girl is the daughter of John Lajeunesse or Seminole, a mixed blood Indian of this reservation and Mrs. Celia Lawson, also a mixed blood. While Winnie was a baby, her mother left the reservation with

one, Speed Stagner Sr., leaving the child here. From that time on, she was taken care of and made her home with her grandmother, Angeline Lajeunesse, until that woman's death. From then on she made her home with her brother. In this time neither her father or mother have given her any care or attention. Her mother is now the wife of R. B. Lawson, a white man and her father has married again. Neither have a home to give her, even though they were so disposed. Her brother and his wife have parted since Winnie went to your school and should she be compelled to return home she would practically have to depend on the goodness of her friends. Then too, if she should find a home, such as it might be, both the day school and boarding school here are very much over-crowded and she could not secure the advantages she needs and should have, at either place.

From the above I believe you will readily see that it is very necessary that she be allowed to remain at Carlisle and given all possible help and advantages, in order that she may be better equipped to face the conditions she must meet when she does return to the reservation.

Trusting that a favorable decision will be reached in her case, I am,"

In view of the fact that Winnifred cannot be cared for at her home and it is not likely that anyone else will have to be deprived of receiving an education at Carlisle if she is kept here it is respectfully requested that I be granted authority to have the girl continue with her enrolment here.

Sir:

Referring further to the Office's letter of the 4th ultimo, in which I was directed to take steps to have parents and guardians of certain students enrolled at Carlisle make provisions for the education elsewhere of such young people, I now respectfully request that authority be granted me to retain at this school until the close of the current school year Nellie B. Brown and Eliza Wacoche, with the understanding that their guardians will pay an amount of \$200.00 each to cover the cost of this year's tuition.

I have a letter from Supervisor Wyly requesting that the plea of Nellie B. Brown's guardian to retain his ward here until June be given favorable consideration and suggesting that it might be well to make a tuition charge for the balance of this year. I believe that there is no reason why an entire year's tuition should not be paid for each of the girls and it will then



The Office has received your letter of November 27, enclosing correspondence with reference to certain pupils at your school whose eligibility for Federal aid has been questioned.

Inasmuch as further investigation in each case discloses facts which justify their retention, at least until the close of the present school term, you are authorized to keep them on the rolls for the present, using your discretion in the matter of complying with the rules set out in Office letter of November 4 as to sending them to their homes and paying their transportation expenses.

Hereafter it would seem advisable to verify the statements made by the pupils on the forms for testing their eligibility for Federal aid before sending them to this Office.

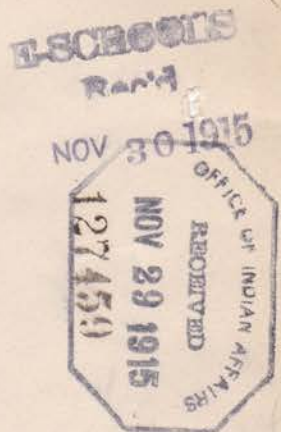

With reference to your letter of July 15, 1915 forwarding blanks filed to test the eligibility of pupils for enrollment at Indian schools and their need of Federal aid, you are advised that the following rules should govern you in the future in the acceptance of pupils.

1. Pupils should not be accepted who are of less than $1/4$ Indian blood.
2. Pupils should not be accepted for whom there exist adequate school facilities at home.
3. Pupils should not be accepted whose parents are able financially to provide an education for them, or who are personally financially able to so provide for themselves.
4. No pupil whose family has given up its tribal affiliations and has been living in a white community should be accepted for enrollment in an Indian school.
5. Pupils who have been enrolled in public schools for a considerable period, should not be accepted for enrollment in Indian schools except under very exceptional circumstances.

Your attention is especially invited to the cases of the following pupils whose reports you submitted to the Office:

Helen Welch, 5th grade, 21 years of age, of $1/8$ Indian blood; has made her home with her sister about 3 blocks from a large school and has attended public school for four years.

Winifred LaJeunesse, 5th grade, 16 years of age, of 3/8 Indian blood, has made her home with her brother about one block from a public school and has attended public school for about 7 years.

Etta Waggoner, 5th grade, 15 years of age, 1/4 Indian blood, makes her home with her parents about one mile from public school and has attended public school for 2 years.

Levi Waggoner, 5th grade, 16 years of age, is brother to Etta and has also attended public school for 2 years.

Donald Brown, 8th grade, 17 years of age, 1/4 Indian blood, makes his home with his parents about 1/2 mile from public school and has attended public school for 10 years.

William Springer, 2nd grade, 13 years of age, and Myrl Springer, 5th grade, 16 years of age, 1/4 Indian blood, make their home with their parents about one block from a public school and have attended public school for 4 months and 4 years respectively.

Eliza Wacoche, 3rd grade, 18 years of age, full blood, and Tockah Apeuka, 6th grade, 20 years of age, full blood, are said to be very wealthy, and it is said that their guardians plan to have them located in a private school where they will defray the cost of their own education.

John Sampson, 2nd grade, 17 years of age, and of full blood, has an income said to be over \$1000 per year.

Wesley Washington, 2nd grade, 19 years of age, and of full Indian blood, has an income of from \$60 to \$65 per month.

Huckleberry Shell, 3rd grade, 19 years of age, and of full blood, has an income of \$7000 per year.

Jacob Spokogee, 8th grade, 19 years of age, and of full blood, has an income of about \$200 per month.

Sealey Alexander, 4th grade, 16 years of age, and of full blood, makes his home with his sister about one mile from a public school, and has a large income from mineral deposits on his allotment.

Nellie Brown, 6th grade, 15 years of age, and of full blood, makes her home with her aunt about 1/4 mile from public school, and is reported by her guardian to be worth \$40,000 in her own right.

Relia Oshkosh, 6th grade, 16 years of age, Roland Oshkosh, 5th grade 14 years of age, and Roy Oshkosh, 5th grade, 16 years of age, of 3/4 Indian blood, make their home with their parents about 2 blocks from a public school and have attended public school.

It is believed that the facts given in each of these cases are such as to indicate that these pupils are not in need of government assistance, and steps should be taken to have the parents or guardians make other provisions for them either in private schools or in their own homes.


