V. Peel, Chief Clerk in Charge, dated August 4, transmitting correspondence in regard to the enrollment at Carlisle of Jefferson Perry, a 5/8 Choctaw young man, 22 years of age, you are advised that inasmuch as the records show that this young man belongs to the restricted class, authority is hereby granted for him to attend the Carlisle School, with the inderstanding that he will pay his transportation expenses to and from the school. The enclosures to Mr. Peel's letter are returned herewith as requested." In view of the authority that is granted the young man may now be sent on at any time. The application for his enrolment has been filed and we will arrange to have him begin his studies immediately upon arrival here unless he should arrive before the 5th of September.
