Lincoln, Superintendent of the Thomas Indian School, Iroquois, New York.

He is of the opinion that the children are too young to be associated with the pupils enrolled at Carlisle and furthermore that there are no facilities at his school to care for children of their age.

Referring to the inquiry that is contained in the letter I return herewith I respectfully state that we do not have the facilities at Carlisle to care for such younger children as are mentioned by Mr. Cole, and as it seems inadvisable to allow those so young to associate too constantly with older pupils who too have not learned how to be careful in speech and manner in the presence of those whose habits are being formed it is my opinion that Mr. Cole should be instructed to refer his inquiry to Mrs. Emily P. Lincoln, the Superintendent of the Thomas Indian School at Iroquois, New York. In that school children of the same age would be in attendance.
